I think all of it; I'm aware that you cover a lot of different areas; the most visible ones are the public things like the Science Saturday, the International Dinner, the movies, the teacher appreciation events & the foreign language classes, but they aren't necessarily the best, just the ones that I know most about.
I am pleased that the fundraising for the school is done as a funds drive, rather than as several fund-raising projects throughout the year. I would much rather give money than sell wrapping paper. Also, I love the after-school language program and chess club, and all the fun little extra-curricular activities that the PTO orchestrates. Facilitating the grants is also high on the list, as many good things have come from those grants. Mostly, I appreciate that the PTO continues to find meaningful and varied ways to use the extra money that comes into the school from Randall football parking--I believe these extra funds, AND THE WAY IN WHICH THEY ARE USED, make Franklin-Randall different from most other public schools in Madison.

More visibility in showing what it pays for.
It's very strong!!!
Provide more enrichment programs after school such as forming a variety of clubs(ie. geology club).
Get a very clear, simple mission, that everyone can get behind.
I think the PTO changes from year to year depending on the parents involved. The passion for traditional events is great, but each cycle brings fresh new ideas which can also be good. It's difficult to generalize specific improvements because of the revolving door nature of the organization. I think asking teachers and/or administrators about specific needs at the outset of each year is a good idea, then each PTO group can expand on their own enthusiasms.
I really don't have any criticisms at all; I'm very grateful for everything the PTO does.
Perhaps by creating a stronger presence at the classroom level--what about setting up "room parents" for each classroom? The PTO would only have to get the ball rolling, maybe by offering a brief "orientation" session for each volunteer at the beginning of the year. The room parent would be mostly a help to the teacher and other parents in the room, but would also be strongly encouraged to attend PTO meetings. This would be a nice way for people to get involved in the PTO who feel more comfortable helping at the classroom level than by serving on a committee, for example.
Investigate farm to school lunch--REAP program

Make your newsletter easier to scan for information. Dense blocks of text in a tiny font make it hard to scan for relevant information. Most parents are not looking for chatty news, but for timely and concise information relevant for their children- boxes with upcoming concert schedules organized by grade, etc.

Figure out how to get more parents involved.

The email list has a lot of "calls for newsletter submission" emails. It would be nice if we could get a list that has more content and less of that administrative kind of stuff.

Seek feedback on specific PTO events/activities (e.g. after-school foreign language) so that the events/activities can be continuously improved.

I cant think of any but i have never attended meetings so I am unclear on mission and goals.

I think keeping up the theme-focused meetings, as have been done this past year, would be important. The PTO may also survey parents about specific issues that are of concern to them that the PTO might want to take up.

I have been very impressed by what the PTO has done. This year seems especially good. I just want to say that I greatly appreciate all the good work the PTO is doing, and am truly thankful to the parents who take their time to work on our kids' and teachers' behalf.

### Is there anything we didn't ask about that you want to be sure we know?

When there's the question about facilitating the relationship between parents and schools, based on my one personal interaction with Britta Hanson and my friend's experiences with her, she should understand that she's not been particularly well-received by at least a few and someone should consider helping her with improving the relationship. Knowing how important "customer satisfaction" has become in our current work society, it's something to consider.

Keep the foreign language program as is.

From the parental point of view, there is confusion and resentment about early release and numerous days off or additional early release days throughout the year. The district does a TERRIBLE job of explaining the reasoning behind weekly early release and the "extra" days off. If the PTO is able to explain, parents would be appreciative.

The movie night at Franklin was a hit. It would be wonderful to have more after-hour family events at the school like that. That said, the Glo Ball at Franklin was VERY scary for parents of young kids. It was chaotic and dangerous for some of the small children. I witnessed three kids (including one of my own) crying after getting hit in the face or head with glo sticks. Kids were getting separated from their parents in the dark. While the "glo" concept was neat, putting hundreds of grade-school-aged children in the dark is not appropriate. That event should be re-tooled for next year. Also, I am curious to hear what the teachers say about the value of special appreciation events like the luncheon, etc. If I were a teacher I would be more apt to want working equipment like the copiers mentioned above, or plenty of supplies, etc. Having a linen-tablecloth luncheon would be less important to me. But I'm \*not\* a teacher, so I am eager to hear what they have to say about this ! Thank you for doing this survey. I look forward to hearing about the results.

I wonder whether the PTO can advocate for the parents when the school adopts a policy many parents oppose. For example, I understand that Franklin has a new policy that there are no longer any open visitation days in the spring where parents can observe the different classrooms for 5 minutes and get a sense of the different teachers. I was told that it's too distracting for the students and that parents were also not allowed to ask to observe the different classrooms individually. Before my child started at Franklin, I found observing the classrooms very informative and reassuring, and I don't believe it was particularly disruptive. I really think it's an important way for the parents to feel connected to the school and to understand what goes on there.

I think some of the questions do get at this, but I feel that the biggest impact the PTO has is in filling the gaps by enhancing the learning opportunities and infrastructure that might get cut in times of funding stress, like we are experiencing right now with state funding cuts. For example, I appreciate the field trip support and grants for classroom equipment and materials in particular. The Randall playground project is exceptional, and I also support grants for meeting the basic needs of PE classes. The emphasis on health is good - the snack program etc.
